Ria Kalsi is the Founder and CEO of Matriarch - the business teaching you what you didn't learn at school. From grief and identity to race and mental health, Matriarch equips people with the tools to navigate life's toughest moments with confidence, empathy, and self-awareness - helping them face life with less fear.

Matriarch began as Ria's personal outlet during her own journey of loss and identity. Raised in the UK by first-generation Sikh Punjabi immigrants, Ria often found herself asking where she truly belonged. At 19, in the middle of that reckoning, she started Matriarch as a blog - a space to write, reflect, and make sense of her experiences as a young British Asian woman.

What started as self-expression soon struck a collective chord. By 21, Ria had turned Matriarch into a movement and then into a celebrated business - dedicated to destigmatising the conversations so many of us were never taught how to have.

Ria has grown Matriarch into a thriving business that has worked with leading organisations, including Amazon, Verizon, and King's College London, reaching thousands through its workshops and resources. She is an expert educator, often celebrated for her ability to connect with audiences from 12 to 60+ years old.

At the heart of everything she builds is one philosophy: 'Be who you needed when you were younger.' It's the guiding principle behind Matriarch's teaching, its culture, and the safe, empowering spaces it creates for people to feel seen, supported, and ready to grow.

Alongside her work at Matriarch, Ria is a sought-after speaker, panellist, trained facilitator and writer, known for her honest and hopeful approach to topics like education, womanhood, and entrepreneurship.







Grieving Young -Hope, Healing and Everything In Between

At the age of 19, Ria lost her Dad out of the blue. Her life changed overnight, and she was thrust into adulthood beyond her means. Ria, along with her family and friends, was totally unprepared to deal with it, lacking even the vocabulary to communicate about grief. Since then, Ria's used Matriarch to educate people on grief and is determined to improve grief literacy across the UK through Matriarch's sell-out 'Grief 101' workshop.

Ria grew up hearing one message from her immigrant parents:

"Get your education, because no one can take that away from you."

The mantra shaped her - but her journey through the British education system revealed how much traditional schooling misses. At 19, she founded Matriarch to close that gap. Led by four core values - Nurturing, Wisdom, Collectivity, Grounded power, Matriarch teaches the emotional, cultural and mental-health literacy that's often overlooked but is the key to happy, healthy classrooms.
